ABOUT THE AWARDS:

JERRY MEARS SERVICE AWARD

This award is given to an individual who has dedicated his career to promoting the sport of football in the state of Maryland. It is named after Hall of Fame coach Jerry E. Mears, who coached at Arundel and Meade high schools. Coach Mears was also the first president of the MFCA in 1984.

JOHN VOIGHT ASSISTANT COACH AWARD

This award honors coaches in the state of Maryland who have 20 years of loyal service as an assistant football coach. The award was established in 1994, and is named after John W. Voight, who was one of the founders of our state organization and a hall of fame coach from High Point High School.

MARYLAND FOOTBALL COACHES ASSOCIATION HALL OF FAME

The Maryland High School Football Coaches Hall of Fame was established in 1988 to recognize coaches who have not only succeeded on the gridiron by winning games and championships, but have also served as dedicated mentors to the youth of the state of Maryland. The name of each member is engraved on a bronze plaque installed in the University of Maryland Football Team house.

THE JOHN HARVILL LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

This is the top award in the MFCA. It was established in 2015 and was named after legendary high school coach John Harvill, who coached at Gaithersburg High School for 41 years. Coach Harvill is a member of the Maryland State Football Coaches Hall of Fame, and won two state championships, and was a finalist five times. His record of 312-108 (74% winning percentage) is legendary in the state of Maryland.

JERRY MEARS SERVICE AWARD

Bruce Cunningham WBFF, Fox 45 Baltimore

Bruce Cunningham, the long time Sports director and weekday sports anchor on WBFF/Fox 45, retired From the station in March, 2022 after a 31 year run on Baltimore television and was one of the biggest promoters of amateur high school football in the town. Bruce continues to appear on his weekend slot as one of the Fan's 1057 FM as an enthusiastic commentator reporter and fan of Baltimore sports.

Bruce arrived in 1991 from Alabama and retired last year as the last remaining member of the original TV staff personalities at WBFF. Bruce created the weekly "High School Athlete of the Week" award and has always recognized the huge impact of the award on the players, their programs and the sports' profile, within the community. Bruce's Sports Unlimited Sunday broadcast at 10:30 p.m. became a weekly staple of Baltimore sports news for amateur and professional sports fans throughout the region.

Bruce's 45 year career in broadcasting began in college as an 18 year old VCU student working at the local television station, WXEX-TV. Bruce's career includes time as the play-by-play announcer for the Baltimore Stallions of the Canadian Football League and the first play by play announcer for the newly arrived Baltimore Ravens. Bruce also worked as the Ravens public address announcer at the M&T Stadium for 20 years, stepping down in 2019.

Bruce was named as the Maryland Sportscaster of the Year by the National Sports Media Association in 2022 and has been recognized by many of his peers for his mentorship and leadership within the broadcasting community. Bruce's other awards include the AP Best Sports Features award in 1993, 1993 and 1994, the AP Best Year-Round Sports Coverage Awards from 1997-2001, 2003-2014 and the Pimlico Old Hilltop Award in 2004. Bruce and his wife Wendy live in Pasadena and are enjoying spending more time with their children and grandchildren.





JOHN YOIGHT ASSISTANT COACH AWARD

Aaron Carter Seneca Valley, Gaithersburg, and Montgomery Blair High School

A standout football player and three-year starter at Gaithersburg High School legendary coach John Harvill, Aaron continued his football career East Carolina University, where he was a dominant defensive end and tackle. He was drafted by the Arizona Wranglers of the USFL in 1986. After he concluded his playing career, he began his high school coaching career in 1993 at Seneca Valley High School, where he served as the varsity linebackers coach and head JV coach for five seasons, during which time, Seneca Valley won several state championships. From 1997 to 2019, Coach Carter served as the defensive line coach and eventually became the defensive coordinator for hall of fame coach Kreg Kephart, helping Gaithersburg to a state championship in 2000. In 2020, Coach Carter moved to Montgomery Blair High School, where he helped shepherd the Blazers to 10-2 record and an appearance in the third round of the play-offs. With his guidance, the Blazers won a home playoff game and advanced far into the playoffs. Coach Carter has also coached basketball at both Seneca Valley and Gaithersburg High Schools, and track and field at Gaithersburg High School, where he coached the regional champion in the shot put on both the 2022 indoor and outdoor seasons.



Coach Carter is also a Gaithersburg High School 2019 Athletic Hall of Fame Inductee, the third Hall of Fame class inducted by the school. He is also a winner if the Gaithersburg Education Foundation Alumnae Award (2020), Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, the Gaithersburg Corvette Club, and the Black Jacket Cruiserz. Throughout his career, Coach Carter has been an integral part of every staff of which he has belonged. He has created strength and conditioning programs to enhance athletic performance, developed winning strategies and game plans, been an excellent evaluator of talent, and aided in the college recruiting journey of several high school football players under his tutelage. Additionally, he has fostered player potential by mentoring players off the field and in academic settings, worked with parents and community to support both individual players and the teams to which they belong, and worked with feeder middle schools to build successful programs.

JOHN VOIGHT ASSISTANT COACH AWARD

George Cotter St. Vincent Pallotti High School/ Georgetown Preparatory School

An Alumni of Georgetown Preparatory School, Coach Cotter graduated in 1980. During his scholastic career , he was a three-sport athlete for the Hoyas, lettering in basketball, track and field, and football. As a standout on the football team, coached by hall of famer Jim Fegan, he earned all-conference honors as a linebacker in 1979. Additionally, he was recognized by the national publication "American High School Athlete" in 1980 for demonstrating outstanding achievement in athletics, academics, and leadership. After graduation, attended The College of the Holy Cross captaining the 75 member Rugby team and graduated in 1984. He began his coaching career in 1986 at St. Vincent Pallotti as the linebackers coach under head coach Stu Mackintosh. From 2000 to the present day, Coach Cotter has served at Georgetown Prep, coaching outside linebackers and defensive ends under head coach Dan Paro, who is also in the MFCA Hall of Fame. He had the opportunity to coach two sons at Prep, Tommy (class of '06) and Pat (class of '09).



Coach Cotter has contributed to some fantastic team accomplishments as an assistant coach. From 1986 to 1989, St. Vincent Pallotti had an excellent record 37-1-2. He has been an integral part of a Georgetown Prep program with a record of 148-69, and a 37-1 streak from 2000-2003. Additionally, in 2002, Georgetown Prep was ranked #1 in the DC Metro Area by the Washington Post. He has been a part of staffs that have compiled six undefeated seasons and thirteen league championships. Coach Cotter lives in Olney with wife Jean, and has three adult children residing in Charleston, SC. and Manhattan Beach, California. Congratulations Coach Cotter, on a fantastic career!




JOHN VOIGHT ASSISTANT COACH AWARD

Eugene Swain Boonsboro High School

Coach Swain attended Hancock High School and played varsity football in 1966; at the time, Hancock was the smallest high school playing football in Maryland. After graduation, he attended Frostburg State College and graduated in 1971 with a geography and teaching degree. After a brief tenure teaching in Baltimore City Public Schools, he moved back to Washington County and taught Earth Science at Boonsboro High School. He coached Varsity Football at Boonsboro under Head Football Coach Don Lewis, and was responsible for coaching wide receivers and defensive backs.

In addition to coaching, Coach Swain attended Hagerstown Community College summer classes for the care and prevention of injuries. In his estimation. "I taped hundreds of players throughout my career." He also was an integral part of the scouting operation at Boonsboro. When he started coaching, the game film had to be developed. So, Coach Swain dropped the game film at the Greyhound station in Hagerstown on the last bus to Baltimore on Friday night so it could be developed and viewed at practice on Monday. He scouted teams and cataloged formations, down and distance, and play action passing to prepare effective scouting reports. He also translated that tried and true scouting method to VCR, digital video tape, and finally Hudl. Coach Swain was also one of those coaches every



program needs to be successful, because he wore so many hats. In addition to treating injuries and scouting, he also assisted in the weight room in the summer, and refereed Boonsboro weight lifting competitions. He attended spring practices and seminars at the University of Maryland and the University of Delaware to learn new plays, formations and drills.

While the early years in the 80's were tough, Boonsboro was very competitive from the 1990's through 2006. Boonsboro won the 1993 state 1A championship, had a 17 game winning streak from 1993-94 which ended when we lost the 1A championship in the last quarter to our rivals, Smithsburg. Coach Swain retired from coaching and teaching in 2006, but remained a part if the scouting operation for a few more years. He also was a basketball referee for 42 years for local private and public high schools. Coach Swain really valued and appreciated the camaraderie of the coaching staff through the years. He feels that the example of good sportsmanship by the coaches is a source of pride. He enjoys running into former players and reliving the good times. After retiring from teaching, he worked at a local grocery store and at an organic body care company in Middletown. His wife and he have been living for half the year in an RV volunteering as campground hosts in various state and national campgrounds, and will spend the summer this year in Acadia National Park in Maine.

JOHN VOIGHT ASSISTANT COACH AWARD

Jeff Cranford has coached high school football in Maryland for thirty-two years. He was a four-year player at Salisbury University, where he played under legendary coach Mike McGlinchey. In 1986, he was a member if the Salisbury team who played for the national championship in the "Amos Alonzo Stagg Bowl." He was named the "Salisbury University Offensive MVP" in 1987, and was a team captain in 1988.

From 1990 to 2007, Coach Cranford served as the defensive coordinator for fifteen seasons at Southern High School in Anne Arundel County. During his tenure, Southern tallied six playoff appearances, one state semi-final appearance, and one state final appearance. From 2008 to present, Coach Cranford has served as an assistant coach at Northern High School, being promoted to defensive coordinator in 2012. He worked in that capacity until 2016, and from 2017 to the present, he has coached the linebackers. In 2021, Northern High School won the Class 3-A MPSSAA State Championship, the first in school history.

Coach Cranford has always been a well-respected coach in Southern Maryland, and his record validates his reputation. His teams have always been well-prepared and well-coached, and he is deserving of this award. Congratulations, Coach Cranford, on a great career.

Todd Appel Fort Hill High School

Todd Appel's name is synonymous with Forth Hill High School football. After serving as an assistant coach for fifteen seasons, he was named to the head coaching position in 2008, a position he occupied for twelve seasons. During his tenure, he sported a career record of 142-16 in 12 seasons at Fort Hill, which included five state titles.

Appel leaves behind a legacy and culture matched by few programs around the state, winning the Maryland Class 1A state championship four years in a row from 2013-2016, followed up by a title in 2018 to make it five in six years. The 1987 graduate of Fort Hill succeeded Barry Lattimer, with whom he coached for nine seasons and six seasons for legendary coach Mike Calhoun. Lattimer is the son of Fort Hill's all-time wins leader Charlie Lattimer, who went 157-40 in 20 seasons as head coach from 1959-1978. After back-to-back two-loss seasons (12-2 in 2006, 10-2 in 2007) prior to Appel's promotion, the success continued for the Sentinels, going 11-2 in his first season and a trip to the state championship game. Fort Hill fell, 20-19, to Dunbar, which featured NFL and West Virginia University standout Tavon Austin.



Since Appel had been the head coach at Fort Hill, plus the two seasons prior, the Sentinels have reached the Class 1A West Region Final every year since 2006, barring the change in playoff structure by the Maryland Public Secondary Schools Athletic Association in 2019, which put Fort Hill in the region co-final. The Sentinels were 12-0 in opening-round games under Appel, outscoring opponents by a combined 520-123 for an average score of 43-10. In the process, the Sentinels won ten 1A West Region championships and played in seven state finals. Prior to the 2019 season, Fort Hill had appeared in six consecutive state championship games, which set an MPSSAA record when Fort Hill made their fifth straight appearance in 2017. Coaching football in the city of Cumberland is a tall task—



and honor — for anyone, regardless of whether it's Fort Hill or Allegany. A solid baseline for area football fans is how they do against the opposing city school. Appel did just about as well as anyone, winning seventeen of his eighteen meetings with the Campers as head coach of the Sentinels by a combined score of 547-263. Appel's Sentinels were 5-1 against the Campers in the playoffs, with the point differential being seven (117-110). In total, Appel was part of 13 of the school's 14 state championship appearances — seven as head coach, five as an assistant (1994, 1996-1998 and 2006) and one as a player (1986).

When Appel stepped down in July 2020, Fort Hill had been to fourteen state finals and he was part of thirteen of those finals -- seven with him as head coach, five as an assistant coach and one as a player. Appel is second in wins all-time at Fort Hill, finishing with a 142-16 record for a school-best .899 winning percentage. After retiring from coaching, Coach Appel moved to the Eastern Shore of Maryland, where he teaches fourth- and fifth-grade students in Worcester County.

"God is good. I really believe that he changed my life," said Appel. "We as a team learned to trust each other through the things we did off the field. Because of that trust, they knew that I had their back and they had mine. When people know you care about them, I think as a group you can do wonderful things. In the external world, one of the critical things as far as winning, achievements, golden trophies and things, God looks at the heart and I was very thankful that he was able to bring that to me and to the kids. Along with that, we had some good, loyal coaches that I had each others' back also. Any organization with good leadership, you can trust them. There's been a lot of time spent with those kids. ... It's so cliche that you say (in the huddle) '1-2-3 family,' but we actually were. And I think that's what brought on the external success that the world likes. But the reality of it was we were just happy to be together."

Having achieved so much on and off the field, it's understandably difficult for Appel to pinpoint some of his fondest memories. "There are so many memories," he said. "I've been blessed to be able to have tons of relationships with all kids. All types of socioeconomic. This area of Cumberland, we're just so blessed to have that. The reality of where they come from and trying to learn from them as much as they can learn from you. With the multitude of kids, you can learn a lot." For Appel, one of the many that he'll always remember was about his family, including his wife Suzanne, daughter Harper and son Walker, and all that they have done to support him in his coaching journey.

Steve Crounse Patuxent and Northern High Schools

Steve Crounse is one of the greatest coaches in the history of Southern Maryland high school football. Crounse started in Patuxent, where he was for fifteen years, then moved to Northern Calvert for three years. He stepped down in 2020 to take a position on Bill McGregor's staff at DeMatha, but for the 2022 season he was back in Calvert County, at Patuxent. He has a career record of 151-65.

The Crounse football dynasty began when Steve started his coaching career in Pennsylvania at Delaware Valley High School in 1994. Since that time, Coach Crounse has built a tradition of success at every school that has been lucky enough to have him take the helm of their football program. His teams have always been exceptionally well prepared and technically sound. However, one of the things that has differentiated Coach Crounse from his peers is his ability to both create highly successful game plans and make in game adjustments. The proof is in both his record and in the quality of the young men that have come through the programs that he has led through the years at both Patuxent and at Northern High Schools. However, one of the best and most validating experiences of his career is having the ability to coach his sons and coach all three of his sons in state final games.

Crounse's sons Tyler and Reese were born in Pennsylvania, but they spent most of their years growing up in Maryland after their father started his head coaching career in 2002 at Patuxent High School. Since Steve spent a lot of his time coaching, his sons grew up in the game of football. The game left an imprint on the boys because it was their childhood. "The thing about the boys is that they grew up in football. They grew up in locker rooms. They grew up in the practice fields. They idolized all those guys they watched as little kids, and all of three kids became excellent football players. Tyler became his quarterback in 2012, and they went to the state championship in 2013 but lost. Reese followed up by becoming his father's quarterback in 2015, which was the same year they won the state championship. After many years serving as head coach at Patuxent, Steve decided to move to Northern the following year, where his sons followed him. Reese then led

move to Northern the following year, where his sons followed him. Reese then led Northern to a regional appearance, and he got the school record for fifth-most passing yards in a season. As for the youngest son, Zach, who is five years younger than Reese, he has been in Northern since middle school. By the time he became a freshman in high school, they pushed him into becoming a quarterback for varsity mid-season. Zach won only two playoff games during his freshman and sophomore years as a varsity quarterback. Then, Zach's junior season was taken away because of the pandemic. When Coach Crounse left Northern to take a job at DeMatha, Zach had followed his father; However, when, at the end of that year his father left the Stags program, Zach decided Northern was home for him. He ended up coming back for his senior year and winning a championship.

"When they got their opportunity, they were very committed and serious about representing their parents, our family, their schools, and themselves. They had each other too. They were all on the sidelines for each other," Steve Crounse said. And the legacy continues: at Patuxent High School, he will have his son, Tyler, as his offensive coordinator. He looks forward to working with the young kids and building the program back to glory. And, while there are no more sons in the pipeline, Coach's daughter will continue the Crounse family tradition of excellence as a standout field hockey player at Patuxent.

As coaches, we tend to measure everything we do in wins and losses. Championships are the standard measure of success. When we all look back at the end of our careers, we tend to see what we as coaches have accomplished through that lens. But as one can see in regard to Coach Crounse's career, having the opportunity to work with and mentor his own children throughout the life of his career, overtakes all of the success and accolades he may have garnered throughout his tenure as a head football coach. The family tradition of excellence, dedication and success passed down from father to children is probably the most validating aspect of his storied career.

Reggie White Milford Mill High School

Reggie White is an icon at Milford Mill, as well as throughout the state. His reputation as a great coach and a fantastic human being is indisputable. That reputation has also been bolstered after leading the Millers to a 14-0 record and an MPSSAA Class 2-A State Champion title in 2022. In doing so, White became the rare person to play AND coach his alma mater to state titles. White played on Milford Mill's 1987 state title team. He played at Oklahoma State and NC A&T during his college career before a four-year NFL career. He was part of the 1995 San Diego Chargers squad that lost in the Super Bowl XXIX to San Francisco. White played in the AFC final but was inactive for the Super Bowl. He returned to Baltimore to coach at his alma mater and has kept Milford Mill near the top of the Baltimore County standings for most of his 20 years as head coach. He has a career record of 163-62 in 20 seasons.

Throughout his tenure as the Millers' head coach, Coach White's teams have been well-respected throughout the state as being tough, well-prepared, and displaying excellent sportsmanship. This year, the program took a giant leap under the tutelage of Coach White and his excellent staff. The Millers defeated Kent Island 25-16 after trailing 10-7 at the half at Navy Marine Corps Stadium in Annapolis on 2 December 2022. It was the Baltimore County school's second consecutive trip to the state finals and third since 2017. Telling his players at the beginning of the season that they had some "unfinished business" to take care of after the heartbreaking 29-14 loss in last year's state finals, Coach White finished his 20th year with a 172-74 record. The 14-0 Millers won their second state title, their first coming back in 1987 when White was a player during that 13-0 season.

Milford Mill enjoyed a tremendous year, outscoring its opponents 635-111 and racking up 5,794 yards in total offense on its way to the championship. The Millers were led by All-Metro Offensive Player of the Year Sean Williams Jr., who rushed for 2,059 yards and 37 touchdowns during the 14-0 season, and junior quarterback Deshawn Purdie, a second team All-Metro selection, who was 13/20 for 138 yards passing, throwing for one TD and running for another in the final game. Coby Jones' 20-yard interception return for a touchdown with 4:45 left iced the game for the Millers. The Millers were also led by All-Metro first team OL Rashard Herring and Emmanuel Gee, a senior DL who had 62 tackles, 26 for losses and 12 sacks during the 2022 campaign and second team All-Metro senior WR Daysen Shell.

Often, coaches have excellent records, and people tend to view that record and the wins and championships as the things that quantify a great coaching career. However, while Coach White has been highly successful in that regard, as a person and family man, he has crushed that level of success. With the help of his wife Nicole, he has built a community at the school that does an excellent job of looking after the kids in his charge. He has also made it a family affair, coaching both of his boys through the Millers football program. Reggie Jr. was a scholarship player at Monmouth, and played briefly for the New York Giants. He now plays in the Canadian Football league with the Montreal Alouettes Coach White also got the opportunity to coach his youngest son Nicholas in the Big 33 Classic (of which he was the Head Coach), in which Maryland beat Pennsylvania. Nick currently attends Monmouth University.

Reggie has an excellent record of service to the football community in Maryland. He serves on the executive boards of both the Baltimore Touchdown Club and the Maryland Football Coaches Association, as well as on the Greater Baltimore Chapter of the National Football Foundation and the Scholar Athlete Banquet, which it sponsors. Reggie White is a true champion on and off the field, and is an excellent example of the qualities that a Hall of Fame coach should exemplify.

Ernie Ceccato

Poolesville and Quince Orchard High Schools

This thirty-three year Montgomery County coaching veteran has been the head coach in three different sports, began two new football programs, named football coach of the year five different times, and won a total of fifteen football championships. Coach Ceccato began his coaching career in 1967 at Robert E. Peary High School as the defensive coordinator of the football program and an assistant wrestling coach. After five years, Ernie was asked to develop the new football program at Poolesville High School. During his sixteen years at Poolesville, he also was the head coach for both the wrestling and girls softball programs. In 1988, Coach Ceccato was tapped to create football and softball programs at the new Quince Orchard High School. Ernie went on to serve as the athletic director at QOHS as well. His success can best be measured by the numerous championships and honors he and his teams have won.

Coach Ceccato's teams have won four Maryland Regional Titles, five MCPS League Championships, four Montgomery County Division Championships, one Maryland state runner up crown, one Maryland state 4A title, and named the number one team in the Washington metropolitan area during the 1991 season. Despite starting two new football programs from scratch, his overall head coaching record stands at 146 wins, 91 losses, and two ties. Ernie also served as Assistant Coach for the Maryland Big 33 and Head Coach for the Chesapeake Classic/Super 44 All Star Football Games.

As a result of his team's successes, Ernie was named:

- Washington Post Metropolitan Coach of the Year, 2 years
- Touchdown Club of Washington's prestigious "Timmie Award"
- Montgomery Journal Coach of the Year
- Montgomery County Football Coach of the Year, 3 years
- Outstanding coach in Montgomery County three times
- Maryland State Coaches Association Coach of the Year
- Maryland All State Football Hall of Fame
- Penn Hills High School Hall of Fame in Pittsburgh
- Poolesville High School Hall of Fame.
- Quince Orchard High School Hall of Fame





In addition to his coaching, Mr. Ceccato taught a full schedule of physical education and served as the Athletic Director at Quince Orchard High School. He was named the QOHS Outstanding Staff Member and the Outstanding Secondary Physical Education Teacher for MCPS. Ernie also was the recipient of the Maryland Excellence Award in Teaching and was recognized by the Maryland State Delegation for Leadership and Commitment to Youth. Upon retirement from MCPS, Ernie and his wife Anne moved to Greensboro, Georgia where Ernie continued his love of teaching and coaching for an additional 15 years in Georgia as a teacher, football coach, and District Athletic Director for Greene County Schools. Ernie relaxes on the golf course, his bass boat, and is a huge University of Georgia Bulldogs fan. He and Anne spend as much time as possible with their son, Ernie Jr., his wife Karen, and our three grandsons, Christian, Grant, and Patrick.
